London Newman Lecture, Thursday 9 May

Melanie McDonagh spoke about Newman's letters to women. She observed that while Newman was a man of his times – in no sense a feminist – he had a great respect for women and their gifts. Perhaps because he felt them no threat to his ministry, he confided much more to women friends in his difficulties as well as giving guidance in their spiritual lives. Melanie illustrated her theme with some delightful stories. While the number attending the London lecture was disappointing it has had some immediate effect in that a group from the Hertfordshire Circle plans to study Newman's letters in more detail, using *John Henry Newman - A Portrait in Letters* edited by Roderick Strange. Newman Association AGM, Saturday 9 June

The 2019 AGM was held in Gower Street, London. After the AGM Ian Jessiman outlined the benefits of becoming a Charitable Incorporated Organisation and also explained that 'direct conversion' from a Charitable Company (as at present) to a CIO had become possible provided there was no change in the 'objects' of the Association. It was agreed we should proceed by this route. The more contentious issue of whether membership should be restricted to Catholics, or open to Christians or to all, provoked much more debate. It was suggested that the best policy was to proceed to a CIO and to leave this issue to be debated in the future. (A short account of the AGM is given in the October Newman Journal pp 22 -24)

We had Student Rabbi Gabriel Webber enlightening us on Jews and Judaism today, and separate talks on the Psalms (with Dr Geoffrey Turner) and Islamic Architecture in Spain (an illustrated talk with Ms Frances Smith). We enjoyed the welcome at the Bar Convent and appreciated all the facilities there, which added to the social success of the occasion.
