The 2013 London Newman Lecture was given by Fr Michael Campbell-Johnson SJ on the theme *Crisis in the Church* at Heythrop College, London. Father Michael, a Jesuit for more than sixty years, is currently a member of the Jesuit community at Farm Street, London. A former provincial of the British province, he was at the centre of the Society's reforms following Vatican II, spending a quarter of a century working alongside Father General Arrupe in Rome as Head of the Society's Social Justice Secretariat. Fr Michael's talk was given the day after the election in Rome of the Argentinian Jesuit Cardinal Jorge Mario Bercoglio as Pope Francis.
